Commemorated annually on the 4th of January, it coincides with the birthday of Louis Braille, a French citizen who lost his sight after an accident as a kid and sought to better his situation. He came up with an idea of using raised dots to make a special code that can be read by fingertips. Today recognizes his contributions and appreciates how braille has made life better for millions of blind people around the world. It also reminds us that visually impaired individuals should have the same rights as everyone else. This day was first celebrated in 2019.

Braille is a tactile representation of alphabetic and numerical symbols using 6 dots. It is a code thus various languages and subjects such as music, science or mathematics can be written through it. It can also be described as a tool using combinations of red dots to spell out numbers and letters. There are sixty-three combinations of these dots and different countries have modified and formulated their own forms.

Facts about Braille



It is not a language.

It is an alphabet that can be used to write almost any language and versions are available such as Arabic, Chinese, Hebrew etc.



There are two versions.

Uncontracted braille spells out every word while contracted braille abbreviates familiar words.



There are toys in Braille.

Monopoly and Lego are available in braille.
